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SPOTLIGHT ON REFRACTORIES IN MEXICO, MO

On July 14, 2016, former workers at the Mexico Refractories, Kaiser Refractories and National Refractories facilities feasted on fried chicken, broccoli, fruit salad, meatballs, mashed potatoes and gravy, Italian green beans, cherry pie and ice cream as they renewed old friendships and told more than a few old stories. The Mexico Missouri Senior Center hosted the event.

A feast for the eyes as well as the stomach, many former employees brought along old pictures to recall the days of working together, including stories about helping America's naval fleet during World War II. Following lunch, attendees toured the Firebrick Museum, where they enjoyed displays of memorabilia from the various refractories.

Glenn Hatfield (Mexico, MO) and his wife Annette arranged the event, which was so popular that Glenn believes many of those in attendance will continue to meet. "There were so many stories to share, and it had been such a long time, that I think it's quite possible some of the former employees from the surrounding areas will get together again," says Glenn, who started at Mexico Refractories on Nov. 6, 1951. "I started out at the plant but was promoted to top management after four or five years and worked there

for a total of 46 years."

The refractories in Mexico, MO, have a long and proud history. Audrain County, where Mexico is located, once had one of the richest deposits of fire clay in the world, easily mined by open-pit methods, making it especially suitable for refractory purposes.

The young business man, A.P. Green, saw the potential and bought the Mexico Brick and Fire Clay Company in 1910 for \$85,000. Five years later, it was worth over \$200,000.

The company grew during World War I and saw an even larger growth surge during World War II, when a huge demand for refractory products to line war ship boilers took place.

Before long, however, the thriving company found itself with some stiff competition. J.B. Arthur, an executive with A.P. Green, requested ownership interest in the company. When he was refused, he started Mexico Refractories in 1928.

"My father, Charles A. Smith, was one of the A.P. Green executives that joined with J.B. Arthur to found Mexico Refractories," says long-time Kaiser employee **Con Smith** (Bainbridge Island, WA).

It turned out to be a good move for Charles Smith and his colleagues. By 1940, 300 million bricks were being shipped and the company had 450 employees. By the mid-1950s, it had grown to 787 employees.

"My dad had so many stories to tell about how the two companies competed,"

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Con says. “I remember one about Mexico Refractories beating Green in the marketplace by a clever ploy. Both companies sold liquid mortar in 100-pound drums on pallets of 12 drums per pallet. Tons of mortar were sold to lay up the bricks that both companies produced to line industrial furnaces, and the prices were very competitive. Brick masons did the layup by hand. Mexico Refractories mortar consistently outsold the Green product for a very clever reason. They placed a bottle of whiskey in one of the 12 drums on each pallet and the brick Mason’s would open drums on each pallet until they found the whiskey. Since mortar has a short shelf live after being opened, it is unknown how much mortar was opened that never could be used and orders just kept coming! Real country boy marketing,” says Con.

In 1959, another company came into the picture – Kaiser Aluminum, which purchased Mexico Refractories. “My father was Executive Vice President of Mexico Refractories when they merged with Kaiser,” Con adds. “I gave Glenn Hatfield a lot of my dad’s memorabilia when he and others in the town started the museum.”

According to old timers, the town was so

split politically by the two competing companies that workers didn’t dare date anyone from the competition!

Con found himself working for Kaiser Refractories in 1962 after receiving his MBA from Stanford. He worked in production at Moss Landing, CA, and Mexico, MO, until 1967 when he found himself in Oakland, CA, working on Kaiser’s acquisition of Ceramica Industria Haedo, an Argentine refractories company. Con became Vice President and General Manager of the newly acquired company in Buenos Aires, Argentina until 1975 when he returned to the United States. He went on to become Kaiser Refractories Division Vice President, reporting to Steve Hutchcraft, in 1982.

In 1985, Kaiser Aluminum sold Kaiser Refractories to National Refractories and Minerals Corporation, an employee stock ownership plan. Con moved over to the newly formed company serving as Chairman, President and CEO. Currently, Harbison-Walker Refractories operates the only refractory facility out of Mexico, MO.

In 1988, Corinne Azen Krause published “Refractories: The Hidden Industry: A History of Refractories in the United States, 1860 to 1985.” Available through Amazon.com, the book includes many stories including the following related by Con Smith: JB Arthur and Joe Cruson were known to drink together, and
