The 50th Anniversary of Henry J. Kaiser's passing took place on August 24.

With the ongoing tumultuous events associated with the 2016 presidential election, I am reminded that our company founder, Henry J. Kaiser, almost became President of the United States. It was 1944 and President Franklin D. Roosevelt was running for an unprecedented fourth term. The choice for his vice-presidential running mate came down to either Henry J. Kaiser, the war-time's most talked about industrialist, or Harry S. Truman, the publicly active senator from Missouri. President Roosevelt chose the politician rather than the industrialist. When President Roosevelt died in April 1945, Truman became President.

It is most likely that had Mr. Kaiser become President, he would not have entered the aluminum business as he did in 1946. How would that have affected our individual lives? Where might we be today?

MEMBER PROFILE: MIKE VENIE

Mike Venie worked for Kaiser for 23 years with assignments in Spokane, WA, Connecticut, Pennsylvania, Illinois, Ohio and Pleasanton. He and his wife Claudia have three children (Shelley, Todd and Evan) and three grandchildren. They recently sold their home in Chicago, IL, and moved to Phoenix, AZ, where they have had a second home for many years.

When did you begin working for Kaiser?

I started working at Trentwood, WA, right after college. My plan had been to go on to law school and become a lawyer, but by the time I graduated with my four-year degree, I had a wife and one child and another on the way. I needed a full-time job. Kaiser was looking for an Assistant Traffic Manager, so I applied and got the position. That was in August of 1972 and working for Kaiser was a real plum back then. I also did production control in the summer and was very fortunate to get a special assignment. President Nixon had discontinued price controls and, for Kaiser to raise prices, they had to provide the government with lots of information.

I headed up the effort. When I finished that assignment, I moved into Customer Service. I soon realized there were no 9 – 5 jobs at Kaiser, but I loved it.

What happened to law school?

When I first started working for Kaiser, I attended law school at night. It was a crazy time. My wife was still working for an ophthalmologist specializing in

pediatric eye disorders. She quit after she had our second child. I continued law school for two years, but as I started my third year, I realized that I needed to make a choice between a law career and a career in business. I really enjoyed all the opportunities available at Kaiser and dropped out of law school. It was a good choice as I received a promotion at Kaiser soon thereafter.

Tell us about your career with Kaiser.

I got to try a variety of things during my time with Kaiser. I held numerous managerial positions in sales, marketing and plant operations and spent a year and a half in fabricated product sales in Hartford, CT, 20 months with building and construction, four years in electrical products, followed by five years in the rod bar and wire division in Newark, OH, and, lastly, an assignment to develop the automotive market for Kaiser. It was all very exciting but also very challenging as I constantly had to learn new business processes, markets, etc.

I worked primarily on the commercial side in non-differentiated products. All companies had to follow standard specs. To compete, we needed to find something that made Kaiser stand out to the customer. I always remembered what **Henry Kaiser** said, “find a need and fill it.” My job was to find out what was important to the customer and what we had that was different from our competitors.

I worked in seven different locations, but Claudia and I looked at it as an adventure. We both had grown up in Spokane, WA, and our first move found us in Hartford, CT. By the end of my career with Kaiser, we had lived on both coasts and in the middle of the country.

What were the highlights of your 23-year career?

There were so many highlights that it's hard to pick. My first one was when I was the Department Manager for Customer Service at Trentwood, WA. Kaiser had a best operating team competition and our team won. The management staff was invited to a breakfast with **Cornell Maier**, who had come out to give the award at the ceremony that night. I was the most junior guy at the breakfast but Mr. Maier asked me for my opinion on the business outlook. It was pretty exciting.

Later, I worked with **Ed Coyne** in the Rod and Bar Division in Newark, OH. Ed had this idea of moving the finishing operation to a new plant in Tennessee, so we could be more competitive with Alcoa. At first, I told him it was the dumbest idea I'd ever heard. He asked me to think about it, and I soon realized its merits. We had a few complications and a fair amount of criticism at first, but that plant in Tennessee turned out to be one of the real gems in the Kaiser portfolio.

Another highlight happened in 1991 when I was asked to organize a corporate effort to develop our auto market. At that time, we were very decentralized, with many plants having something to do with automotive. I had to pull it all together and, thanks to all the divisions getting on board and committing significant resources, we entered the auto manufacturing market on a strong footing. Within 18 months, we were in the Japanese market and saw significant growth of Kaiser's auto industry. From 1991 to 1995, we formed two joint ventures with Japanese and European aluminum companies and ended up

doing business with virtually all of the major automotive companies and their major suppliers.

The biggest highlight from my career with Kaiser was being able to be acquainted with and work

with so many truly wonderful, dedicated people. No matter which division we worked in the people were always highly professional and welcoming to Claudia and my family. We still stay in contact with several Kaiser colleagues from the various locations we worked.

When did you leave Kaiser?

In 1995, I left Kaiser for a number of reasons. For one, Northwestern Steel and Wire had been heavily recruiting me for a position in the mid-west, which is where our kids were living at the time. Things had also changed a Kaiser with the MAXXAM acquisition. At the time, Kaiser also had the Rule of 70. If your years of service and your age equaled 70, you could retire. I had just made that by about six days, so Claudia and I agreed that I should leave Kaiser and take the position with Northwestern.

What other positions have you held since leaving Kaiser?

When Northwestern liquidated in the early 2000s in response to all the steel imports from Europe and Asia, I went to work as President and CEO of an international powder metals company in Pennsylvania specializing in automotive

components. We made a number of acquisitions and ended up with manufacturing plants in England, France, Germany, Mexico and China in addition to the U.S. In 2004 alone, I logged 350,000 air miles. Claudia and I decided I needed a break so I resigned and took a year off. I later became a partner in a specialty metal bar service center in Chicago, IL, followed by CEO of an aluminum coil anodizing company also in Chicago. I officially retired in 2011 after two bouts of cancer. Since then, I've had temporary positions acting as interim CEO with various companies until they found a permanent employee.

We sold our house in Chicago, IL, and have been staying with relatives and friends while the sale is finalized and our furniture and other possessions are dealt with.
