A trip to Wendover, UT, allowed **Betty Lou Koska** (Winnemucca, NV) to visit

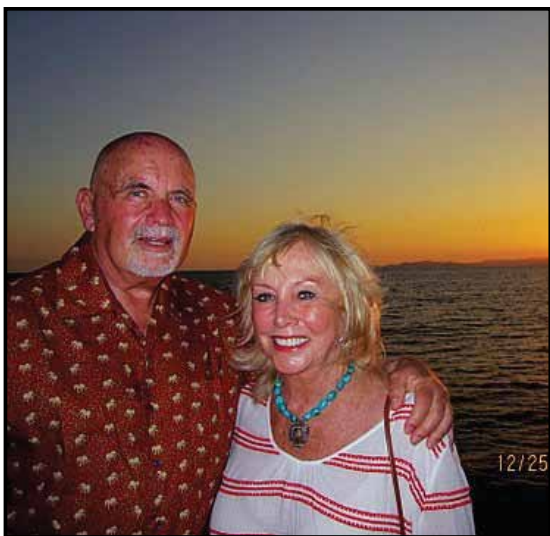

MEMBER PROFILE: Tom (TJ) and Sue Summerson

Long-time Kaiser employees, Tom and Sue Summerson, live in Spokane, WA. Married 60 years this coming September, the two met while working for Kaiser in Trentwood, WA. They have two children (Lynda and Mark) and two adult grandchildren (Paul and John). Lyn is a retired educator and Mark is a clinical psychologist. Paul and his wife Rita live in San Francisco. Paul is a design engineer and Rita teaches piano and flute. Grandson John is a musician, glass blower and currently studies animation at an art school in Portland, OR.



While attending Steve and Wendy Ping's annual Ping Fling for CFT retirees, TJ and Sue had a surprise celebration to honor their 58th wedding anniversary. Our daughter Lynda set the whole thing up," says TJ.

How did the two of you meet?

TJ: I started in the Department of Metallurgy Research (DMR) at Trentwood, WA, in 1951, and Sue started in 1953. She first worked in the technical writing group before becoming the switchboard operator for DMR.

Sue: I thought that TJ was pretty nice, but I wasn't interested in getting married. We took dancing lessons together and on the way home, he'd always ask if I wanted to stop for a hamburger. I thought 'No way. I'm not getting involved.' But, we ended up getting married after about six months. Guess I missed out on a lot of hamburgers.

Tell us a little about your careers with Kaiser?

TJ: It was the beginning of the golden years of the aluminum industry when we started. Being in the corrosion section, I got to interface with all of the fabricating plants and their customers. Corrosion resistance is a major factor in the use of aluminum, so there were lots of challenges and exciting things to work on - from electrical conductor, geodesic domes, culvert/storm drains, radiators, hot water tank anodes, tankers, boats to

aircraft components.

Then in 1969, DMR moved to Pleasanton, CA, and we became part of the Center for Technology (CFT). One hundred and twenty-five families from Trentwood, WA, moved there, joining others from the Chemical, Refractories and Reduction Divisions.

Sue: There was nothing in Pleasanton, CA, at that time. You could shoot a cannon down Hwy. 680. Now, there are so many homes and lots of traffic.

I didn't work when we first moved to California. But, after a few years, I got restless. Our daughter was away at college by then, and our son was in middle school. I went over to Kaiser Sand and Gravel and offered to work for free if they'd teach me about their switchboard. They let me spell the secretaries. Then, one of the girls quit, and there I was all trained and ready. After a while, there was an opening at CFT and, since I had also worked there when they needed

extra help, they hired me. I was the receptionist, ran the switchboard and booked the travel for all of CFT.

What were the highlights of your career?

Tom: There were many but some that stand out include DMR development of a new set of aluminum magnesium alloys that were weldable, strong and corrosion resistant. They are still widely used today by the U.S. Navy, U.S. Coast Guard and private boat builders. Ferry boats in CA and NY are made of aluminum our corrosion section also developed 7049-T7XX alloy for aerospace forgings. I travelled with our forging metallurgists to aircraft companies and suppliers, and Larry Barker convinced the U.S. Air Force to replace the main gear on the B52 with 7049-T73 forgings.

I was also fortunate to work with the Coast Guard and to convince a USCG admiral that our large aluminum tanks (60x60x120) could be used to transport natural gas and that the water would not cause corrosion problems. He joked that 'if you were a used car salesman, I'd buy a car from you.' Convincing Dick Evans to provide financial support for the long-term corrosion testing we were doing at CFT was another highlight. With Steve Hutchcraft and Tex Pritchett, we were able to get Armco Steel's President to re-instate Kaiser Refractories as a supplier of refractory products. That was truly a highlight!

Sue: I remember one

time at CFT when I got a call from this man back east in the middle of an earthquake. I told him what was going on and asked if he could call back a little later. He apologized for calling! I guess I sounded pretty calm, but I was watching these giant plates of glass in our lobby flexing in and out. They were set in rubber or something and made to flex during quakes. But it was pretty weird. Another time, we had a major fire when they were casting a lithium-containing alloy, and I had to alert all the emergency crews, fire and police and take messages back and forth.

TJ: Tex Pritchett, our VP of Research at the time, recognized Sue for doing a great job and remaining professional and calm during emergencies. She received a citation from management. She was also great at recognizing voices. Twenty years after she retired, we got a call in Spokane, WA, from George Binczewski, and she called him by name before he identified himself. He was amazed!

Are either of you still involved in the aluminum industry?

Sue: I retired in 1990 when TJ transferred back to Trentwood, WA, to become technical coordinator on the new high-speed coater line. He retired again at the end of 1995, was re-hired again in 1996 for three months to work on special projects, and then rehired again for two months in 1998 during the Trentwood strike. He ended up working for Kaiser for over 45 years. I took my retirement more seriously.

TJ: Although I'm finally done being rehired, I still do consulting work, and I'm active with several technical societies: American Society for Testing Materials, International, where I was fortunate to receive both the Award of Merit in 1989 and the F.L. LaQue Award in 2007; American Society for Metals; and the National Association of Corrosion Engineers.

Do you still see other Kaiser retirees?

TJ: Kaiser really was a family. We have so many friends through Kaiser that we're still in touch with. We go to the Ping Fling, a party for former CFT employees, at Steve and Wendy Ping's home in Pleasanton, CA, each year.

Sue: We've both been active in KASRA-Trentwood since 1996. I've served on the telephone calling committee locally. TJ has been a board member for the past five years and, more recently, became a regional member reporting to the main KASRA board.

Do you volunteer in your community as well?

Sue: For the past 10 years, we've both volunteered at the Information Booth at Spokane International Airport. We have so many stories from working there. I remember this young Korean man

who came to study English at WA State University in Pullman, WA, but when he got to Spokane, he had missed the last bus to Pullman. We invited him to stay overnight with us. He was a wonderful house guest and even slept on top of the covers so as not to dirty our sheets. Rather than have him wait for the next bus to Pullman, WA, the next day, we decided to drive him ourselves.

Tom: I'm also a volunteer with the Experimental Aircraft Association's Young Eagles Program. Kids from 8 – 18 get a free ride in a light airplane. Local pilots volunteer their time and planes. I'm part of the ground crew. It's great to see the smiles on the kids' faces when they come back after their flight. I still have a private pilot's license, but haven't flown for the past five years, except as a passenger in the B17 and a –T6 trainer.

Sue: We also play bridge two or three times a week, and we've been "volunteering" to do aerobics three times a week for almost 30 years. I still make wine bags out of cloth with various logos, airplanes, sports teams, and sell some of them to local wineries
