A MESSAGE FROM THE KASRA PRESIDENT

Dear Fellow Retirees/Surviving Spouses:

KASRA membership. Each year in July, we send out a hard copy of our newsletter to retirees and surviving spouses, regardless of KASRA membership status, along with a dues enrollment form. We do this to encourage those who are not currently members to join. The dues are modest and are used primarily to defray the costs of printing and mailing newsletters (not everyone prefers an electronic version). This is a marvelous communication tool enabling all of us to keep in touch with fellow retirees and surviving spouses around the country and, indeed, around the world. If the cost poses a hardship for you, please let us know, and **we will continue to include you** in our newsletter distribution. For your information, as of April 2, 2014, we have 1,459 KASRA member retirees, 505 surviving spouse members, 39 friend members and 999 non-KASRA member retirees.

News from the VEBA. The Board of Trustees will be mailing out 2014 reimbursement request forms to VEBA participants soon. Units eligible to participate in the VEBA Plan had enrolled. We continue to search for missing participants and ask for your help in finding them as well. As a final thought, to assure continued participation in the VEBA Plan in the event you become incapacitated, it is important that you make another family member aware of the VEBA Plan and how it works. We also suggest that you maintain a VEBA Plan file for these benefit announcements and forms.

One final very important point – when you move, please remember to notify both KASRA and the Third Party Administrator (address noted in previous paragraph) of your change of address. The Third Party Administrator and KASRA are two separate notifications since they are separate. At present, the VEBA is unable to locate a number of retirees and surviving spouses who have moved and have left no forwarding address. If the VEBA is unable to contact you, you will miss out on important information concerning the VEBA Plan, including benefit notifications, and benefit claim-filing deadlines.


Accomplishments . . .



MEMBER PROFILE: Ed Coyne

Ed Coyne worked for Kaiser for over 36 years in eight different plants/divisions including Jamaica and Australia. He now lives with his second wife B (short for Beulah) in Leesburg, FL. Katie, his first wife, passed away while they were living in Jamaica. Ed has four sons, 11 grandchildren, one great granddaughter and a great grandson on the way.



Ed (far right in straw hat) participated in the “Olympics” at The Plantation where he and his wife B live. “They put on a three week Olympics every October with every kind of athletic event – modified, of course, for the ravages of age,” he says.

Tell us a little about your time at Louisiana State University and the ROTC program.

To be honest, I got through LSU on a football scholarship. My scholarship was originally for baseball and basketball, but the coach asked me to go out for football, and I just stayed there – never did play the other sports. During my time at LSU, we got to play for the national championship. We lost to Oklahoma, but, at least, I got to play in that game.

I was also part of the ROTC program at LSU. When I graduated, I had the opportunity to be part of the U.S. Air Force’s Office of Special Investigations

as a Special Agent. It was a real eye opener. The head of the OSI was a former deputy director of the FBI, so we were trained in those techniques. I worked in criminal investigations and counter intelligence but I never went overseas. In a lot of ways, it was a good background for business, particularly all the report writing we had to do.

When did you start working for Kaiser and at what facilities?

I began my career with Kaiser on May 28, 1954 at Baton Rouge, LA. From there, I went to Chalmette, LA, for four years. In late 1958, I found myself at the start-up of the Gramercy, LA, plant. Being at a plant as it’s firing up can be stressful, but it can also be very rewarding.

In 1961, we moved to Ravenswood, WV, and in 1963, I went into line management and was promoted to superintendent. But things really got interesting in 1966 when my wife Katie and I and our four sons and daughter moved to Australia. I became operations manager of Comalco Products, a Kaiser joint venture with CRA, Australia’s second largest public

company at the time. Promoted to general manager in 1967, we developed and installed a business strategy that transformed the company from a loss to a profit position. The company didn't just expand, it exploded. We doubled capacity and tripled sales and developed an all-national management team.

We returned to the U.S. in early 1974 when I became administrative manager of Trentwood, WA. But, we left six months later for Discovery Bay, Jamaica, where I ran Kaiser Bauxite Company. We worked together in a unique partnership with the Jamaican government. Despite the economic, political and social turmoil, we were able to strengthen the company until the Jamaicans could run it on their own. They were technically skilled and great people to work with, and they were at their best when the chips were down. My time in Jamaica was the most memorable and rewarding endeavor of my Kaiser career. If they hadn't paid me to do it, I would have had to pay Kaiser to let me do it.

We left in 1986 when I went to Newark, OH, as Vice President and General Manager of the RBW division. I retired from Kaiser at the end of 1990.

Jamaica, 1980. National Awards Day as Governor-General of Jamaica, Sir Florizel Glaspole, bestows the Order of Distinction -- Rank of Commander (Honorary) upon Ed. It was the highest national award that could be given to a foreigner at the time.

My career with Kaiser encompassed 36 years and eight different plants/divisions. I've truly been very lucky throughout my life. Kaiser was the only corporation I ever worked for or wanted to work for.

What was it like traveling around the world with your family?

The kids went everywhere with us. They got to go around the world twice and visited something like 34 countries.

Australia turned out to be a terrific place for them to go to school. We were there for eight years, and I credit the study habits and rigors of the Australian school system with getting my boys accepted at every major university they applied to. Unfortunately, we lost our daughter to a drowning accident while we lived there.

What was the most rewarding part of your career?

At the end of the day, it's not the tons of product that you ship or even the customers that you serve. It's the people you work with and their families that stay with you for the rest of your life.

Helping others recognize their potential and develop their abilities and talents was the most rewarding thing for me. I really like being the chief cheerleader – setting goals and then motivating the team to meet those goals. It's thrilling to see people exceed what they think are their limitations.

I also feel very fortunate that I was able to work with two people that I really admire – Governor General of Jamaica, Florizel Glasspole, and Edgar F. Kaiser. Mr. Kaiser traveled to Jamaica quite a bit and his integrity was incredible.

What did you do after you retired from Kaiser?

I did some consulting, but I primarily went into academia, teaching at Nova Southeastern University in Fort Lauderdale, FL, where I had received my Master's in International Business. During that time, I completed my Doctorate in International Business at the University of Bradford in the United Kingdom.

I had always wanted to learn more about my grandfather's place of birth. He had emigrated to the U.S. from Ireland when he was 10. I went there in 1997 as the Academic Dean of American College Dublin, while my wife B did volunteer work at the American Embassy. I've also taught for 10 years at Samford University in Birmingham, AL. Most recently, I taught at Huntingdon College in Montgomery, AL.

I retired from teaching in 2012, and now, I keep busy with occasional consulting jobs including The Coyne Partnership, Inc., a company my sons Kevin and Shawn set up in 2006. I'm the CFO and

Secretary. My oldest boy, Edward Jr., is a Metallurgist and Manager of Mechanical Testing for Lockheed Martin, while Colin works at Samford University.

What's it like working with your sons?

It doesn't get any better than that. In addition to working with Kevin and Shawn in the business, I've co-authored a number of articles with them. I'd often have to go up and stay with them while we worked on projects, which gave me an opportunity to watch my grandkids grow up. Great job perks!

Do you keep in touch with other Kaiser retirees?

I still have quarterly contact with the Tennialum plant in Jackson, TN. We often attend their picnics marking each fifth anniversary. Number 25 is coming up and B and I hope we make the invitee list again. The plant has far exceeded the dreams RBW had for it at start-up.

I'm also still in touch with a group of retirees from Kaiser Jamaica Bauxite. It's been 28 years since we last worked together, yet the memories of that incomparable team and those years together, do not fade.
