2016. It should be pointed out that if you do not file in a timely manner, all your rights to receive your qualified benefit for that year shall expire and be forfeited. So don't let this opportunity pass you by. Be sure to take advantage of what you have coming to you.

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MEMBER PROFILE: Richard (Dick) Humphrey

Dick Humphrey began working for Kaiser Aluminum in 1954 at Tacoma, WA, as a Production Trainee. He retired in 1989 in Oakland, CA, as Vice President and General Manager of Primary Aluminum Products. Dick, who lost his wife Vivian in 2010, continues to live in the home they built in Shingle Springs, CA.

College Graduation was a special day for you. Tell us about it.

That was some day. I graduated from the University of Washington, got married to my high school sweetheart and received my Naval Officers Commission all on the same Saturday. My degree was in Production Management, a branch of The School of Business Administration. I had started out in Civil Engineering, but there was a recession going on in the '50s, and I believed changing majors improved the odds of finding employment.

In the end, it didn't matter much as the Korean War was going on, and I began active duty immediately after graduation.

I was assigned to a refrigerated cargo ship and spent the next two years at sea supplying the fleet in Korea with food.

How did you get involved with Kaiser?

When I was released from active duty in 1954, my home port was Alameda, CA. My wife Vivian and I and our first son were living in Berkeley, CA. I had been sending out resumes for months but, because of economic conditions, responses were poor. Then I saw an ad in the paper that Kaiser Aluminum was looking for production trainees. I applied, interviewed and the rest is history.

Tell us about your Kaiser career.

I started in 1954 in Tacoma, WA. Since Vivian and I were from Seattle, WA, it was perfect, but then after only seven months, the company transferred me to Chalmette, LA. As a Production Trainee, I worked in all the various departments at both Tacoma and Chalmette doing whatever was asked and getting acquainted with the process, the systems and the people. They kept me really busy, but we managed and I learned a lot. Before I knew it, I was made Foreman of an Anode Shift Crew at Tacoma. There I learned quite a bit from the union president and from the Potroom Superintendent, Evans Cook.

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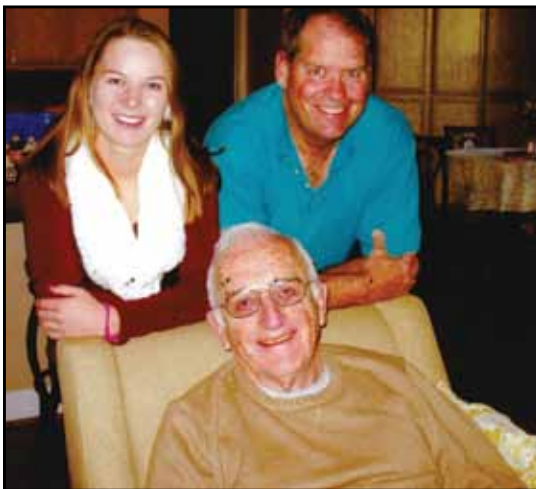
I transferred back and forth between Chalmette and Tacoma throughout my career, working my way up to Plant Manager in Tacoma, Production Superintendent in Chalmette and then Works Manager. I was transferred to Oakland as Assistant Division Manager in 1975. My time at Chalmette was particularly useful as I worked as foreman, general foreman and department superintendent in most operating departments.

What were some of the challenges working for Kaiser?

Taking over operating groups that I knew nothing about was intimidating! But, I learned that if you trusted the people in the groups, listened to them and gave them a chance, they would do the same for you. Eventually, I lost my concern and found my assignments more a positive challenge than something to be afraid of.

What are your fond memories of working for Kaiser?

My strongest recollections are of working with people with integrity and commitment to common goals. The plants were filled with really good people. In

the '60s, Kaiser was a family. No matter where you worked you knew everybody. At that time, people worked for the company and not for themselves. Edgar Kaiser would come in, chat with you, and then put on his dirty clothes and go around the plant like one of the workers. That all changed later, of course, But in my 40-year plus career, I never felt cheated, or lied to, or taken advantage of. It made for a good life, and the people I worked with became friends.

Did you travel a lot for Kaiser?

It seems like my last few years were spent mostly on airplanes. I had all the reduction plants reporting to me, which included plants in Washington, Louisiana, West Virginia, Wales, Germany and Africa. I was also on the Board of Directors for the plants in New Zealand and Australia. Lots of jet lag! When my second son graduated from college, he said he wasn't going to take a job that made him travel and be away from home like my job did. Well, he's an executive with General Electric, and he travels all the time!

All the times I traveled to the plants, I was really just in business meetings. I never really understood the city or the local culture until Vivian starting coming along. Then I would stay an extra day, and she'd tour me around the area.

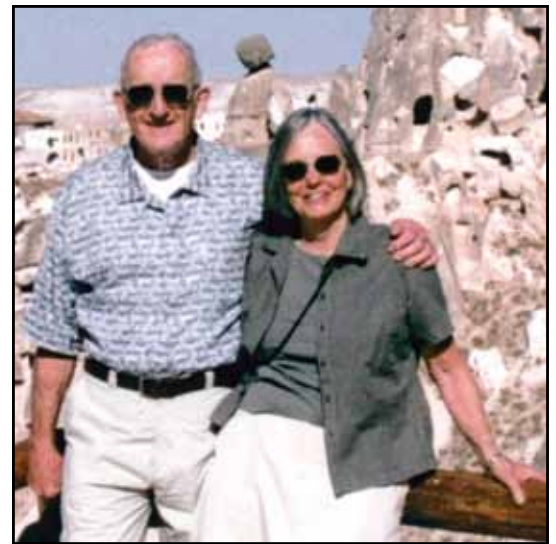
What did you do when you retired?

I was only 59 when I retired in 1989, so Vivian and I made a bucket list of all the places we wanted to go. Before she passed away in 2010 of a heart attack, we had done them all, plus we designed and built our dream house in Shingle Springs, CA.

Tell us a little more about Vivian.

She was the major positive factor in my life. She took all of our moves (eight) in stride. She'd get living accommodations straightened out, get the kids in school and never complain. On three occasions, I had to go ahead and buy a house without her seeing it. We would discuss it on the phone, I'd buy it and she'd just move in and make it a home. She made my life really easy because I never had to worry about the external things. Once she got the family settled, Vivian would decide what she wanted to do, which usually meant volunteering in hospitals or libraries. We were truly soul mates and mutually dependent on one another.

After all the years Vivian had to follow me around, I told her that when we retired, we'd build a home where ever she wanted, and she could help design it. She wanted a view of the Sierras and acreage, so we decided on Shingle Springs, CA, where we have 20 acres. We thought we'd be high enough to be

out of the heat and low enough to be out of the snow. Well, we're out of the snow but we missed on the heat. It rises out of the valley, so it can get pretty hot in the summer.

What are you doing now?

My family keeps me busy. Vivian and I have four sons, eight grandchildren and two great grandchildren. One of the grandkids just got out of the Marines and the oldest granddaughter is a project engineer at a construction firm. The youngest granddaughter was adopted from Russia as a baby and she's now entering college.

My biggest job during this on-going drought in California, however, is keeping the deer in water.
