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MEMBER PROFILE: E. A. (Al) Holbrook, Jr.

Al Holbrook graduated with an engineering degree from the University of Pittsburgh in 1941 and worked for U.S. Steel for 10 years, followed by five years for Pittsburgh Screw and Bolt before starting his international career with Kaiser Aluminum, a career that lasted from 1956 - 1983. One of six children, Al married his high school sweetheart, Nancy, who passed away in 2008. "When I asked her to marry me, she never said yes. She said she'd love to. That really did me in," recalls the 96-year-old, who lives in the home he and Nancy shared in the woods of Richmond, New Hampshire.

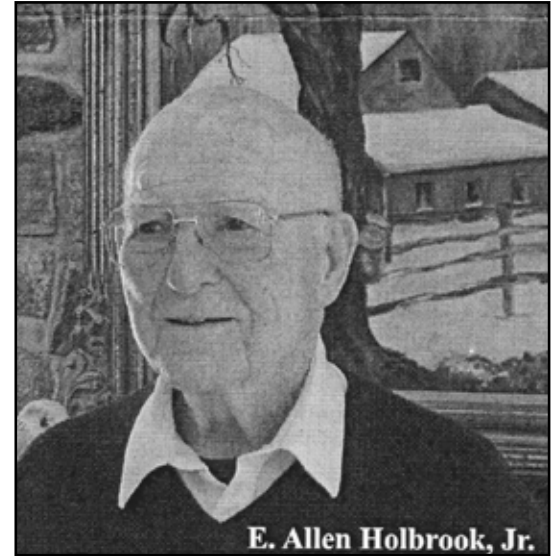
A somber occasion began your career at Kaiser. Tell us about that.

I had gone back to be with my best friend, Bill Edmunds, during his parents' funeral. We were best friends in college but had drifted away when I went to work for U.S. Steel. He started working for Kaiser as the Washington representative. But such a tragic event brought us together again. Bill's father died on a hunting trip and his mother died in a car accident on her way to the funeral in Pittsburgh, PA.

Following the funeral, Bill and I got together and he mentioned that Kaiser was building a new plant in West Virginia and was interviewing new workers. I went down and had several interviews. It looked like they were going to offer me a job there, but then they asked if I'd go to the Production Planning Department at their new Chicago sales offices. Before I knew it, I was the Manager of Production Planning. Nancy and I made our home there for the next 1 ½ years.

That was the first of many moves you'd make for Kaiser, wasn't it?

When I started working for Kaiser in 1956, I told them that I didn't want to go

any further west than Chicago, IL. But, luckily for me, I ended up traveling the world.

It's kind of funny how I ended up in Oakland, CA. Kaiser was expanding in so many areas. The new building on Lake Merritt had just been finished, and they were moving various people from Chicago out to California. They wanted to move the man in charge of extrusions, but he didn't want to go, so they sent me instead.

The move to Oakland launched your international career, didn't it?

Nancy and I lived in the East Bay while I worked at that beautiful office in Oakland for 1-1/2 years. By then, Kaiser was into international work. Lloyd Amos was down in Buenos Aires and, when they asked him to come back to the United States to head up the International Division, he recommended I take his place as Production Manager in Buenos Aires.

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It was very exciting. During my five years there, we built a plant or two and covered lots of South America. We converted Chili from copper to aluminum and developed several plants in Brazil and Uruguay.

Then I was transferred to Sydney, Australia, to set up several different plants including an aluminum can manufacturing plant. From Australia, we developed plants in Hong Kong as well. I used to fly to Hong Kong and, on the way back to Sydney, I'd stop off in the Philippines for a fun project in Manila. Somehow, they had gotten hold of some old broken down jeeps from the Vietnam War and they wanted to turn them into jitneys. So we made aluminum siding for them and helped re-purpose those old jeeps into an economic means of transportation.

Any other interesting projects during your 11 years overseas?

Thanks to Hong Kong's one and only aluminum building withstanding a tornado, we were home free in that country. The only thing that cracked in the aluminum building was the steel! That really helped us develop various projects on both sides of the island. One in particular had to do with war time just

like the jitneys in the Philippines. This time, one of our partners in China found a sunken World War II aircraft carrier. Since they were in the scrap business, they brought it up but didn't know what to do with it. It was full of oil and had a catapult on it, so we helped them make it into an aluminum extrusion plant. We developed the aluminum siding and sheeting for the building as well.

We also played a lot of golf with them. They'd ask our score hole by hole, and whatever score we said, they'd say the same number. So, no one ever beat anyone. At the end of the game, we'd all have crepe suzettes instead of a drink. Just a little different than how we do it in the United States.

Did Nancy enjoy all the overseas postings?

Oh yes. She didn't like to do a great deal of traveling, but she really enjoyed all the different places we lived. She'd get to know all the local customs and she spoke Spanish which helped when we were in Buenos Aires and else where in Argentina. It seemed like where ever we were, she'd end up being the President of the American Association.

After Australia, you came back to Oakland. What were your responsibilities then?

When Kaiser started developing the Kaiser Trading Company, they brought me back to Oakland as Executive VP of Kaiser Trading. Nancy and I got a place in San Francisco, which was a lot of fun. Eventually, I became the President of Kaiser Trading. We sold things to the Russians and Hungarians and even sold oil out of Saudi Arabia. During my last two years with Kaiser, I was the Corporate VP of Transportation and Purchasing. We had quite a whirl. It was really something. I retired in 1983.

What did you do after retiring from Kaiser?

Well, the first thing I did was move to Napa because I like to play golf. Then I started a consulting company. My clients included Bank of America and Hewlett Packard. I did that for six years. It was a fun deal because you're never wrong as a consultant!

How did you end up in New Hampshire?

My family has had a house in New Hampshire for years. My dad and his sister owned it and they left it to my brother and me. It was basically a summer home – no heat or electricity. Nancy and I loved it and, as luck would have it, my brother's wife didn't care for it so I bought him out. Nancy and I then spent a great deal of time winterizing it, adding electricity and heat. We even added a spare generator, because we do have outages in the summer and the winter. Best investment I ever made was getting that propane generator.

The State of New Hampshire then came along and established a fish hatchery in

the lower part of our property. They said we had a natural aquifer down there. They would stock it with around 250 fingerlings (young fish) and then take out about 600 and put them in the various lakes and brooks in New Hampshire. That fish hatchery began another phase of our life.

Now that Nancy is gone, I rent out the house by the fish hatchery. It just so happens the people I rented to are both nurses, which is handy to have out here. They look in on me, and when they saw that I had been given a ceremonial cane as the Oldest Living Man in Richmond, they hid it from me – said it was a bad omen! They're right. I don't need it yet. I still do my own cooking and watering and I drive in the day time. My driver's license is good until I turn 100!
