MEMBER PROFILE: M.E. "PAT" DAVEY

Pat Davey began his working career at the age of 15 running the family gas station and garage in Spokane, WA, but went on to work around the world in international operations, engineering and maintenance management. The 93-year-old lives in Spokane, WA, and has six surviving children (his eldest son passed away), 17 grandchildren and 21 great grandchildren.

Where did you grow up?


I was born and raised in Spokane, WA. My Dad died of Tetanus in Modesto, CA, three months before I was born. My mother moved back to Spokane, WA. My father's parents and my mom decided that I should spend the summer of 1932 with my grandparents on their homestead ranch in Chesaw, WA. I still remember mom taking me to the Greyhound bus and giving me to the bus driver. The bus only went to Orville, about 20 miles away from Chesaw, where the bus driver took me to the Post Office and gave me to the mailman who delivered me to Chesaw.

Back in Spokane, my mom eventually re-married and my stepdad had a gas station and garage. He taught me how to use the cash register when I was just a little guy. Just prior to World War II, he had taken a six-month leave to drive a gasoline

tanker truck and trailer and was frozen to that job when the war started. I was 15, and he left me in charge of the station. I hired my first full time employee, Elmo

Solseng, to run the station while I was at high school. After high school and on weekends, that's where you'd find me. Lots of our customers were Kaiser employees, so I had a good feeling about the company from early on. I graduated from high school in June of 1944 and joined the Navy in October of that year.

When I worked at Kaiser Mead, Elmo was working for Kaiser. Later, he worked at Valco in Ghana where he was one of my Maintenance Foremen.

How did you end up at Kaiser?

When I was discharged from the Navy in 1946, my stepdad had started building houses, so I took back our gas station. I soon decided, however, to go into the trucking business hauling Kaiser Frazier cars from Willow Run, Michigan to Seattle, WA.

I married my first wife and decided I needed more education, so I went to college using the GI Veterans' Bill. I graduated from what was then Washington State College (now WSU) with a BS in Mechanical Engineering in June of 1953. I wanted to stay in Spokane and my one local job offer

was from Kaiser. I started working in metallurgical research at Trentwood Works on temperature testing of new alloys with Al Scott, Tom Summerson, Fred DeMoney, Don Dewar and Elmer Wilson. But research wasn't really my thing, so after two years, I transferred to Mead Works where I implemented the first computerized maintenance PM program in the Kaiser Reduction Division. I was also the Project Engineer for new shot casting and ore unloading facilities and assisted in design and construction of Mead's first rolling ingot casting facilities.

How did you meet your current wife?

I was divorced, living in Tacoma and working at Mead Works with Jim Swan, Steve Pope and so many other wonderful people, when a neighbor invited me over for dinner. He had also asked his sister Edith to join us. We hit it off and started dating. I had gone down to Chalmette, LA, to look at some casting equipment for Kaiser, and when I got back to Tacoma, I found out I was being transferred to New Orleans. I called Edith and told her I didn't want to go down there alone and asked: "How about marrying me?" She said yes and we had a wonderful 48 years together. She had four children by a previous marriage, and I had three, so we had quite a crew together. She passed away seven years ago.

Tell us a little about your Kaiser career.

I was blessed with many excellent employees, staff and mentors during my Kaiser career, allowing me to enter each new assignment and country with enthusiasm. I wish I had room to mention them all. My career involved lots of travel. Luckily, both Edith and I loved to travel. She and the kids traveled with me on long term assignments in Ghana,

Bahrain and North Wales. She was such a wonderful lady and got along great with everyone.

First assignment, Mead Chief Engineer Don Courtright was transferred to Tasmania as Project Manager of the first Billet Casting station in Australia, but he had a non-work problem and needed to return home. I was sent over to finish the project and was there about five months and worked with Ian Read. Upon my return, I was still assigned to Mead but doing a project in Tacoma with Rich Cable, Mac McAdams, Don Gibson and Dick Finch. About this time, I was transferred to Chalmette Works, LA, as Maintenance General Foreman for Propertzi Continuous Rod Casting.

About a year later, I was transferred to Volta Aluminum in Tema, Ghana, where I was the Chief Mechanical Engineer during construction and startup, as well as conducting weekly oversight visits to the Volta River Dam and being responsible for both the electric power supply and a new water works supply for the country. Next, I was Maintenance Manager and then Production Manager for production operations in this 150,000 ton-per-year aluminum reduction plant. I also managed

design review construction and startup of a fourth potline, which increased production 33%.

In 1972, after six and one-half years in Ghana, I was transferred to Manama, Bahrain for two years and worked with Ron Schutz, Bob Walls, John Cook, Lloyd Amos and Lee Hunt. As Plant Manager, I was responsible for a 120,000-ton aluminum reduction plant employing 3,000 people. The plant was not designed by Kaiser and had massive start-up and operational problems.

Then Edith, I and the kids found ourselves back in the United States at Kaiser's Corporate offices in Oakland, CA, for a year before being transferred to Anglesey Aluminum in Holy Head, North Wales, in 1974. It was very gratifying to take this 104,000-ton plant employing 800 people and, in two years, change it from operating at less than 50% capacity (with massive monthly losses) to operating at 90% capacity with a significant monthly profit.

Following our adventures in North Wales, Edith and I came back to Mead Works

in Spokane, WA, for a year before going to Ravenswood, WV, for two years where I was Plant Manager.

In 1979, I was back in Oakland at the corporate office as Engineering and Maintenance Manager for all nine smelters. I retired in 1982.

Did you continue working after retiring from Kaiser?

I became a self-employed consultant working for a group of Spokane businesses, who wanted to design, construct and operate a large aluminum can recycling plant in Spokane, and I also worked on the relocation of an aluminum reduction plant.

In 1984, I became the Vice President and Operations General Manager for Energy Products of Idaho in Coeur d'Alene, Idaho. Then I decided to retire again.

At first, I kept busy remodeling our house and lake cabin and did just about everything else I could find, but it wasn't enough. I formed Davey and Associates, Inc. and went back to consulting, but this time for projects in the UK, Canada, Sweden, China, Ukraine, Russia, Argentina, Venezuela and Trinidad – all dealing with aluminum smelters. I was also a Consultant and Director of Solv-Ex, a tar sand oil refinery in Fort Mc Murray Alberta, Canada.

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Edith had become sick while we were living on the Little Spokane River, and we moved to a retirement home. She passed away in 2013.

What have you been doing since?

I became more active in the Masonic Lodge, Scottish Rite Language Center, El Katif Shrine Temple & Honorary Life Member of Abou Saud Shrine Temple in Panama.

I was also active with International Executives Service Corp. started by Hallmark. They help small companies overseas. You donate your time for around three months, but they pay for your travel and accommodations. They treat you extremely well. I even went to Krasnoyarsk Siberia and stayed at a hotel that Kaiser owned to house our employees while doing a project there.

I have had Consulting Agreements with Management Technology in Alamo CA, Venco in New York, KTD LLC in Spokane, WA, KACC Division Technology Center Spokane, Kaiser International in Spokane, WA, Hatch Engineering, Canada, Fluor Daniel Corp., CA, and Davy McKee Corp, San Ramon, CA.

Now at 93, I limit my volunteering to primarily being the leader of our Pegasus Village on the South Hill local veteran's group. We have 29 active members and have monthly breakfast meetings. There is a special bond among vets who have pledged to die for their country. We offer advice and guidance to the young ones.

I'm also fortunate that our kids live close by, so I have lots of activities with the grand kids and great grands.
